Some members of the association are not included because they offer only minimal funding or they do not accept unsolicited proposals. Profiles include information about the grantmaker's principal funding interests, geographic focus, types of support, eligibility/limitations, financial data, application procedures, etc. The graphic presentation (including charts for types of support that have boxes indicating "yes," "no," and "maybe") is more effective than in most directories, making for a clear snapshot of each subject. Since most of the data is supplied by the members themselves, it is more accurate—especially with respect to application guidelines and types of support offered—than the kind of information gleaned from 990s or secondary sources. The book is indexed by funding area (percentage of funding in major areas) and subject listing.

At a minimum, contact information and some suggestions as to area of interest are provided.
